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

Many Teens And Young Adults Misuse Prescribed Psychoactive Drugs

A new <u>study</u> in Family Medicine and Community Health of a nationally representative sample of 12-25 year old youth and young adults had some interesting findings. Among those prescribed psychoactive medications, the percentage of misuse is 40.1% for tranquilizers, 24.2% for stimulants, 17.6% for opioids, and 14.2% for sedatives.

Drinking Too Much During The Pandemic?

Alcohol use has risen during the pandemic. The University of Arizona followed a group of 6,000 adults from all 50 states to see how behavior was changing. For those under lockdown, hazardous alcohol use, likelihood of alcohol dependence, and severe dependence all rose considerably from April 2020 to September 2020.
