Framing The Conversation Around Youth Substance Use Prevention

This guide has helpful information on how to frame communications with youth regarding substance use. The way something is worded can often be the most important part in making sure a message/conversation is effective. Page 4 has some great examples. Frame the message appropriately depending on the situation, make a case for why someone shouldn't use substances, then suggest actions that youth can take. Check out the guide **HERE**. <u>Trends/Characteristics of Drug Overdose Deaths Involving Fentanyl</u>

Synthetic opioids, including illicitly manufactured fentanyl, was involved in 64% of the more than 100,000 drug overdose deaths during May 2020-April 2021. These percentages are even higher in the Northeast (80%) and Midwest (73%). Approximately 4 in 10 deaths also involved stimulants. Approximately half of those who died had no pulse when first responders arrived. Injection was the most frequent route of drug use. The majority of deaths occurred in the user's own home. Males are also dying at a much higher rate than females. To help end this horrible epidemic, many steps can be taken. There needs to be better education on recognizing drug use signs/overdose, encouragement of fentanyl test strips, and greater naloxone availability and education. 

The Monitoring the Future Survey is conducted each year. Illicit drug use (defined in the image on the left) saw record declines in 2021, the highest one-year decrease since the survey began in 1975.
